1 Summary

What

The UNC Modification Rules currently require that meetings of the UNC Modification Panel take place in London unless the Panel determines otherwise in respect of any meeting. Such a determination would be made by Panel Majority.

This rule has been in place (and has remained unchanged) from the first incarnation of the British Gas TransCo Network Code (01 March 1996) and was subsequently carried forward into the first version of the Uniform Network Code (01 May 2005).

Why

The advent of more flexible working arrangements for individuals and a wider geographical spread of individuals' work locations means that the need for meetings of the UNC Modification Panel to take place in London (and by exception elsewhere) is an unnecessary constraint on the Panel Members and the Code Administrator of the UNC.

Removal of the existing constraints on the location of Modification Panel meetings will provide the Code Administrator with a greater level of flexibility in the arrangement of such meetings thereby optimising costs whilst maintaining the capability of the Modification Panel to fulfil its obligations under the Modification Rules.

How

It is proposed that the requirement for meetings of the UNC Modification Panel to take place in London is removed. Alternatively, it is proposed that meetings of the Modification Panel take place in the location in Great Britain specified by the Code Administrator unless the Modification Panel determines otherwise (i.e. that the meeting take place in a location other than that specified by the Code Administrator). Regarding communication of the meeting location, it is proposed that wherever practical, the Code Administrator provide a minimum notice period of 3 months.

2 Governance

Justification for Self-Governance

Application of Self-Governance procedures is sought because the change proposed is unlikely to have a material effect on the Uniform Network Code governance procedures (nor any of the other aspects described in the Self-Governance criteria). This is because the nature of the change is to merely allow a greater level of flexibility in the location of meetings of the Modification Panel.

Requested Next Steps

This Modification should:

- be considered a non-material change and subject to Self-Governance.
- be assessed by a Workgroup.

It is recommended that the Proposal is issued to the Governance Workgroup for consideration for a period of 2 months. A pre-Modification discussion took place at the Governance Workgroup on 4 August 2021.

3 Why Change?

The UNC Modification Rules Section 5.7.1 currently requires that meetings of the UNC Modification Panel take place in London unless the Panel determines otherwise in respect of any meeting. Such a determination would be made by Panel Majority as per Section 5.1.2(a) of the Modification Rules.

This rule has been in place (and has remained unchanged) from the first incarnation of the British Gas TransCo Network Code (01 March 1996) and was subsequently carried forward into the first version of the Uniform Network Code (01 May 2005).

It is understood that the existing constraint on the location of Modification Panel meetings reflected the work locations of the majority of the members of the UNC Modification Panel and other stakeholders in 1996 and the preference for face-to-face meetings, given the levels of video conferencing technology available at that time. However, the advent of more flexible working arrangements for individuals and the wider geographical spread of individuals' work locations means that the need for meetings of the UNC Modification Panel to take place in London (and by exception elsewhere) is an unnecessary constraint on the Code Administrator of the UNC.

Given this, removal of the existing constraints on the location of Modification Panel meetings will provide the Code Administrator with a greater level of flexibility in the arrangement of such meetings, thereby optimising costs whilst maintaining the capability of the Modification Panel to fulfil its obligations under the Modification Rules.

The inclusion of a minimum notice period for communication of the meeting location is proposed in order to enable parties to effectively plan their time and secure the most efficient travel arrangements. Requiring the Code Administrator to, wherever practical, provide this minimum period of notice recognises that in certain exceptional instances it may not be feasible to meet this minimum notice period requirement (for example sudden unavailability of a venue or the management of the governance of Urgent Proposals).

If this change is not made, the Code Administrator will continue to be obliged to make arrangements for meetings of the Modification Panel to take place in London.

If this change is not made, this may result in higher costs than necessary being incurred by the Code Administrator and individual Panel Members (and other stakeholders) compared to those incurred if more locational flexibility is introduced.

5 Solution

It is proposed that the requirement for meetings of the UNC Modification Panel to take place in London is removed. Alternatively, it is proposed that meetings of the Modification Panel take place in Great Britain in the location specified by the Code Administrator unless the Modification Panel determines otherwise (i.e. that the meeting take place in a location other than that specified by the Code Administrator).

For the avoidance of doubt, a Modification Panel determination in this context shall be made by Panel Majority as per the Modification Rules Sections 2.1 and 5.1.2(a).

Regarding communication of the meeting location, it is proposed that wherever practical, the Code Administrator provides a minimum notice period of 3 months.

6 Impacts & Other Considerations

Consumer Impacts

Minor cost efficiency. Whilst greater efficiencies in the operation of industry governance process may be observed, this is unlikely to have a material impact on consumers. However, any minor cost efficiency may be passed on to consumers via Transporter price control arrangements in the event that code administration costs, over the longer term, are reduced.

Amendment to paragraph 5.7.1	Removes the requirement for meetings of the Modification Panel to take place in London. Establishes a requirement that the location of these meetings (limited to Great Britain) will be specified by the Code Administrator and introduces a requirement that it provide, where practical, no less than 3 months notice of this location.

5 Meetings of the Modification Panel

5.7 Location and form of meetings

Amend paragraph 5.7.1 as follows:

Unless the Modification Panel shall in respect of any meeting of the Modification Panel otherwise determine, meetings of the Modification Panel will take place in London a location in Great Britain specified by the Code Administrator. The Code Administrator shall, wherever practical, provide not less than three months notice of the location of any meeting of the Modification Panel.
