

0864: Update of UNC Code Communication Methods

1. Scope & Considerations

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Obligated communication methods between parties (e.g. Transporters and Shippers) is clearly stated within UNC documents



At present within the UNC General, TPD, OAD and IGTAD documents, such communication should take the form of telephone or facsimile (fax)



Facsimile is no longer a principle communication method across the gas industry. Email, EDSS and Fact24/ANS offer efficient and reliable alternatives

- There are 80 references to facsimile/fax within the documents listed in Table 1
- 64% of all references are within the General document, and 31% within the TPD.
- The specific locations of all 80 references are identified in the accompanied Facsimile

Why change?

PSTN networks, employed by facsimile machines, will be switched off nationally in December 2025. New systems will no longer be compatible with or offer fax capability*



Facsimile produces a substantial quantity of paper and cartridge waste



Retrieving and transposing information from facsimiles requires greater labour demands



We propose to replace all references to 'facsimile' with 'email', providing two UNC referenced communication methods moving forwards: telephone and email*. This will ensure compliance with UNC code when parties communicate via alternative methods to facsimile

Track-change documents, a comparison table and reference summary table will all be provided as supplementary material to a submitted modification application clearly identifying all proposed changes within the UNC General, OAD, TPD, and IGTAD documents



Modification Scope

- 1. Owing to time-sensitive external driver, NGT proposes **0864** is limited to **housekeeping** with **scope restricted** to:
- Removal of facsimile from Code
- Fax replacement with alternative
 Code Communication method
- Tidy-up spelling of 'email'
- 2. Update of subsidiary documents and processes external to Code can commence outside of the Modification following implementation
- 3. IGT UNC update is independent of UNC Modification and may be considered by IGT at IGT Workstream
- 4. Network Contingency consideration beyond 0864 scope and objectives. 0864 is largely a housekeeping Modification.



Dx feedback: "Is anybody still using facsimile? Is there an understanding of the impact to these users?"

- NGT do not require facsimile to communicate with wider gas industry moving forwards
- Alternative methods have now superseded facsimile (e.g. EDSS, Fact24)

Workgroup: Are non-NGT stakeholders using facsimile still, e.g. Shippers and GDNs?

Workgroup: What processes do you still require facsimile communication for?

Dx Feedback: "A legal interpretation of the solution will be needed to clarify that this method is the most appropriate one (in relation to delivery of email). A User can say they did not receive an email. Is email as legally robust as facsimile?"

- Detail on sending/receiving Notices ("any communication… to be given by one Party to another under the Code") by email is outlined in Uniform Network Code General Terms Section B General **5.2 Notices by delivery, post, email or facsimile**
- **5.2.5** "Any notice shall be deemed to have been received: (d) in the case of e-mail, subject to 5.2.8, shall be deemed to have been received one hour after being sent in the absence of any undeliverable return receipt received by the sender during that period."
- 5.2.8 "If the time at which any notice or communication sent by e-mail is deemed to have been received falls
 after 1700 hours on a day, the notice or communication shall be deemed to have been received at the start of
 the next Business Day."
